THE CHAIR'S REPORT



Since 1949 this football Club has been uniquely Edmonton's. Founded by a group of community-minded businessmen who wanted to put Edmonton on the football map, through 74 seasons our Club has proven not only our ability on the field, but our commitment to the community.

Whether it be the Club's first dynasty in the 1950s, or the financial and on-field struggles of the 1960s, then our unmatched string of five Grey Cup wins between 1978 and 1982, through to our most recent victory in 2015, this Club has persevered and cemented itself as a champion on and off the field.

As we all know, history repeats itself and we once again find ourselves in a position – in many ways not dissimilar to the struggles of the 1960s – where action is needed to safeguard the long-term success of the Club. Unlike the 1960s when our first annual dinner and other initiatives helped save the Green and Gold, the complexities of modern professional sports have forced us to take more substantial steps to ensure the Club's success for the future.

Rick has not only been heavily involved in the Special Committee's work, but also correcting course with our day-to-day operations. His experience and standing within the CFL is second to none and has been greatly appreciated.

Along with Rick, I would like to thank Special Committee Chair Bruce Bentley, and Diane Brickner for returning to the Club to lend their valuable expertise during this incredibly important moment in our history. Thanks also go to current Board members Darryl Boessenkool and Brent Hesje, who are also part of the Special Committee. We owe the entire group a debt of gratitude.

As a Special Committee and Board of Directors, we remain committed to handing off the great traditions of our team to the new owner, who we know will do everything in their power to ensure Edmonton gets a top performing organization. New ownership, regardless of the structure, will not take away from the fact that the Green and Gold have and always will be Our Team.

Now, it's time to speak to the future which we know will be bright. This season marks our 75th – a benchmark I hope our forerunners from 1949 would be proud of. 2024 is about connecting our glorious past, with a promising future. Through both the work of our football and business operations staff, I have great optimism about our on-field and in-stadium product. This season is about starting a new trajectory – one that will return our Club to the top of the CFL.

PRESIDENT'S & CEO REPORT



In August of last year, as my wife Joan would say, I took a pause on retirement. I certainly wasn't expecting to be back where I am today.

It's no secret that there have been several trying years for the Edmonton Elks Football Club. I agreed to come in as an interim President and CEO because of my love of the CFL and knowing that I still had Green and Gold in my blood. I genuinely didn't think that I would still be with the Club when it was time to pen the President's Report, but here I am.

Suffice to say that our record on the field of 4 wins and 14 losses – and a significant operating loss – is neither acceptable or sustainable. We did make strides on the field in the second half of the season, which helped us at the gate to be sure.

But that is the past and we now look towards the future. We have spent the off-season going down two roads. One, as per usual, is getting ready for the upcoming CFL season, and two, looking at the future ownership of the team.

As we get ready for the season, we have put a lot of time and energy into both football and business operations. On the football scene, we currently sit tied for first place. It's now up to the coaches and players. My history in the CFL tells me that any team can turn things around in short order, based on how the players and coaches prepare, execute, and at times deal with adversity.

We're celebrating our 75th season this year. One month from today we will be hosting the Saskatchewan Roughriders in our home opener. Our plans for the home opener exceed a typical game, or home opener for that matter. In fact, we will be having a weeklong celebration of our 75th season. There will be an event a day beginning with the EE Alumni Wine Tasting on Saturday, June 1 and on Thursday, June 6 we're hosting our Kickoff to 75 Dinner, which historically would've been our Annual Dinner. Combined the entire week will represent the largest turnout of EE Alumni ever. We have Hugh Campbell, Warren Moon, Dave Cutler, Brian Kelly, Sean Fleming, Damon Allen, Gizmo Williams, Willie Pless, Ricky Ray and Michael Reilly all confirmed along with many other members of the EE Alumni Association attending.

We will be celebrating the past and looking forward to a future with many more years of Green and Gold football. We're striving to make each of our home games a fun place for families young and old. We have expanded our pre-game events into the field house and our game day presentation will be as entertaining as the play on the field.

Because of our financials, we had to make some very difficult decisions in staffing levels. These are not easy decisions. The team that we have now in ticketing, partnerships, marketing, communications, finance and administration are putting everything into making 2024 a fun and entertaining season.

The other road we have been travelling is looking at the future of the ownership of the club. While this journey has yet to be finalized, we have made great progress. I'm confident that we will have more to report on this over the next few months and I can assure you the emphasis on the future ownership of the club remains to ensure that we have CFL football in Edmonton over the next 75 years.

The work in this area has been a heavy load and I would like to thank our Board of Directors who made the very tough decision to take this route through their creation of the Special Committee. To the Special Committee, whose work has been invaluable, a heartfelt thank you. Bruce Bentley, Tom Richards, Brent Hesje, Darryl Boessenkool, and Diane Brickner have been terrific in their work. I want to give an extra shoutout to Bruce, who has chaired the Special Committee and put in so many hours of dedicated service.

Regardless of our future ownership structure, the Club is part of the fabric of our community and we owe it to future generations of Edmontonians and Northern Albertans to ensure that we have CFL football for years to come.

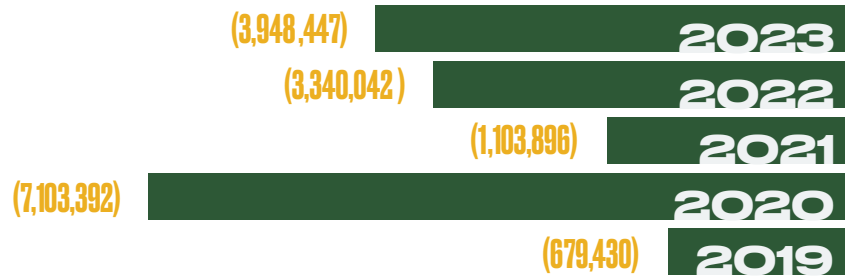
THE TREASURER'S REPORT

FOR YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST 2023

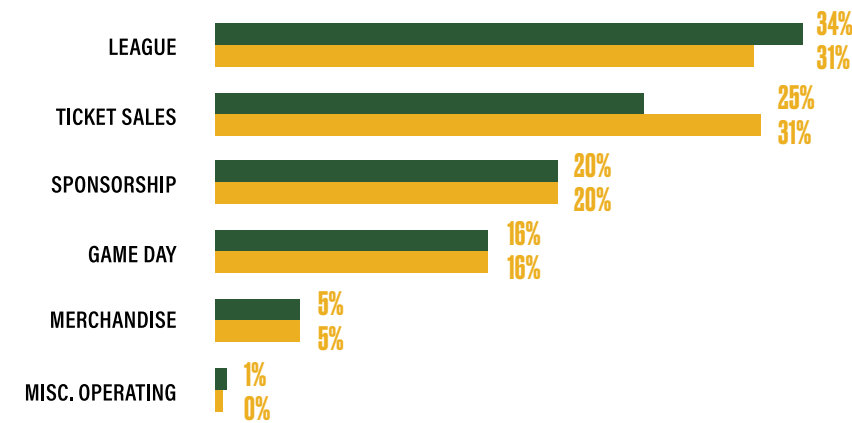
FINANCIAL RESULTS

In 2023 the Edmonton Elks Football Club had a net operating loss of \$3.9 million compared to 2022 operating loss of \$3.3 million. This loss over the previous year was mainly due to reduced revenues of \$1.0 million which were \$3.98 million below budget.

OPERATING REVENUE

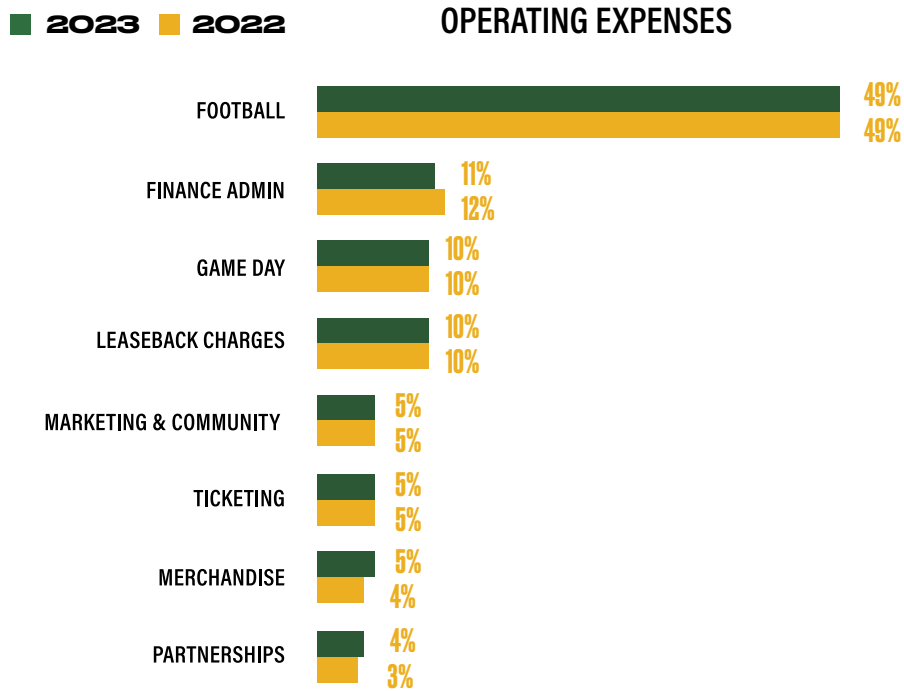


REVENUE

Overall, the Club did not achieve revenue target and finished with \$21.0 million in gross revenue (2022 - \$22.0 million). The decrease from 2022 to 2023 was due to lower attendance that affected ticket revenue, premium spaces, merchandise and concessions. Ticket revenue was down year-over-year to \$5.2 million, (2022- \$6.6 million).

OPERATING EXPENSES

The total operating expenses were \$25.0 million, a decrease of \$433K (2022 - \$25.4 million). Football Operations expenses came in at \$12.2 million, a decrease of \$146K (1%) under 2022. Business Operations were down \$287K (2%) vs previous year which includes CFL leaseback. The Club was within the Player and Non-Player League mandated cap for 2023.



OTHER NON-OPERATING ITEMS

A number of non-operating items that included the Trust Fund investment increase of \$494K, 2022 decrease of \$573K, 50/50 donations of \$755K continue to support and promote Amateur Football in Edmonton.

CASH AND WORKING CAPITAL

Despite the losses caused by the extraordinary circumstances, the Club has sufficient working capital at this time to meet all of its current and anticipated obligations.

Community Outreach

ELKS INITIATIVES

Women's Dinner

The annual Elks Women's Dinner supports the Edmonton Elks Women's Ovarian Cancer Research Endowment Fund, which was set up to provide long-term, sustainable funding for researchers at the Lois Hole Hospital for Women. To date, the annual event has raised nearly \$700,000 to battle the deadly disease.

Elks Fan Day

An annual event for the Club, Elks fans had a chance to meet some of their favorite players up close and have plenty of fun at no charge. Roughly 1000 people attended Fan Day to take part in the festivities.



Organization Golf Tournaments (Alumni + Cheer)

Away from the field, the Elks alumni and cheer team hosted annual golf tournaments to support costs for both groups.

Away Game Coors Light Watch Parties

Partnering with Molson, each Elks away game had a watch party for fans to come together and cheer on their favorite team. In total there were 8 watch parties, with each party accompanied by the cheer team to bring more excitement to the day. Each watch party was held in a different restaurant to help support Edmonton + surrounding area businesses. Over 700 fans gathered throughout the season to support the Elks away games.

Home Gameday Alumni Autograph Sessions

The Alumni Autograph Session brought out 1 alumni per home game, allowing thousands of fans to catch up with their former heroes. The alumni were then welcomed onto the field to honor a serving member of the Canadian Armed Forces. 10 autograph sessions happened this season.

Elks x Tim Hortons Community Tour

The Elks x Tim Hortons Community Tour spanned over the week leading up to the home opener. Players worked at local Tim Hortons in communities surrounding Edmonton including Spruce Grove, St. Albert, Fort Saskatchewan, Sherwood Park, and Leduc. Following our stop at Tim Hortons, we were joined by our mascots, cheer team members and worked with the minor football associations in each community to host a free football clinic, reaching over 500 community members.

SCHOOL INITIATIVES

TELUS EndBullying All Stars

Each offseason, the Elks run a yearly program with TELUS to help children understand the impact of bullying. With over 250 students already impacted by this program, the Elks have visited 6 schools in 2023 and will continue to provide this program in 2024.

Read In Week Guest Reader Program

Elks players, alumni, cheer team, and mascots spent the week of October 2nd-6th reading to elementary and junior high school students. In total the Elks visited 32 schools during Read In Week to read our newly published book "Spike Tales." Each school was given a book to keep at their location for other children to enjoy.

Guest Speaking

The Elks players, alumni, and staff receive regular invites into schools to talk with athletes, classrooms, or entire schools. These invites can be specific Q & A's or a talk on what it means to be a student athlete. In 2023, the Elks attended 7 different schools and impacted over 1000 different students through our guest speaking.



COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

Tim Hortons Camp Day

Supporting one of our biggest partners, the Elks went out to 2 different Tim Hortons locations on Camp Day. Each location brought Elks players who jumped in to help take orders, serve customers, and engage with fans. In total we had 4 different members of the Elks team participate in Camp Day.

Cleats of Strength

A new initiative this year, partnering with MH2Care Medical and Momentum Customs, 7 players were paired up with Stollery Kids to a custom pair of cleats to be game worn and auctioned off in support of the Stollery Childrens Hospital Foundation. As a result, \$10,800 was donated to the Stollery Childrens Hospital Foundation to continue providing life saving support for children in need.

- 2 additional cleats were designed to support other Stollery fund raisers such as the Snowflake Gala and the Stollery Annual Golf Tournament. Respectively, \$900, and \$1000 were raised from these cleats.

ETS

In partnership with Edmonton Transit Service (ETS), Elks players surprised fans at 4 different transit stations in the Edmonton Area. Players signed autographs and donated over 200 tickets to fans during these meet and greets.

Monday Morning Magic

One of the most anticipated events of the year, Monday Morning Magic is when children experiencing disabilities between the ages of 3 and 12 are invited to enjoy the K-Days fair at their own speed, with local celebrities, heroes, and professional athletes at their side. An all-hands-on deck organizational event, Elks players, staff, cheer team, and mascots joined 500 kids this year in having fun at K-Days.



Elks Blood Drives

This year the Elks participated in 2 organization wide blood drives support Canadian Blood Services and help Edmontonian in need.



YOUTH FOOTBALL

Super Sports Day - Kinsmen Club of Edmonton

A first for the city of Edmonton, the Edmonton Elks, Stingers, Riverhawks, and Huskies came together to host a one-day sports camp for members of KidSport Edmonton. Partnering with the Kinsmen Club of Edmonton and the City of Edmonton, this camp was provided for free to for 200 children.

Indigenous Camp

The 2nd annual Elks x Indigenous football camp happened the day after our August 10th game vs. Winnipeg. The Elks partnered with the Indigenous Sport Council of Alberta to provide a football camp for Indigenous athletes only. The camp was a huge success, with 55 indigenous athletes lead through a 2-hour camp by 6 Elks players.

CDMFA Drill Day

The CDMFA Drill Day was held at Commonwealth the day prior to the Labour Day Rematch and Minor Football Showcase game on September 9th . The drill day saw between 250-300 amateur football athletes run through an hour of skills and drills, led by 7 Elks players. Athletes had the chance to work with the players up close, followed by watching them live in game the next day.

Guest Coaching (CDMFA, Huskies, Girls Football)

Engaging with 11 different amateur football associations in 2023 through guest coaching, the Elks players attended practices/camps to provide guidance and instruction to the next generation of football athletes. In total, our players were grateful to work as a guest coach with over 400 athletes and coaches in 2023.

Junior High Flag Football League

The Elks partnered with Junior High Athletics to run a spring Junior High Flag Football league running from April to the end of June. The league had a record high 66 teams, 27 girl's teams and 39 boy's teams. The number of teams increased by 4 from last year and is the largest number of teams the organization has ever had. Mascots were able to attend the championship games in June.

INDIGENOUS LOGO

Created by **Conrad Plews**, who is a Metis artist of Cree background, the logo was inspired by Izaiah Masuskapoe's 2021 Elks logo design.

An Indigenous student at West Edmonton's St. Thomas More Catholic Junior High School at the time of his creation, Masuskapoe submitted his take on the Elks logo after being inspired by the B.C. Lions logo created by Kwakwaka'wakw/Tlingit artist Corrine Hunt. Plews' logo debuted in August when the Elks took on the Winnipeg Blue Bombers for Indigenous Celebration night.



“The design is largely based on the existing Elks logo, as well as the design created by Izaiah. I wanted to integrate both designs while infusing a feeling of dynamic energy and strength,” said Plews, who’s a tattoo artist and owner of Black Market Tattoo in Edmonton.

Note to Summary Consolidated Financial Statements

December 31, 2023

Basis of presentation

The summary consolidated financial statements are derived from the audited consolidated financial statements of Edmonton Eskimo Football Club (operating as Edmonton Elks Football Club) (the Club), prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, as at December 31, 2023 and for the year then ended.

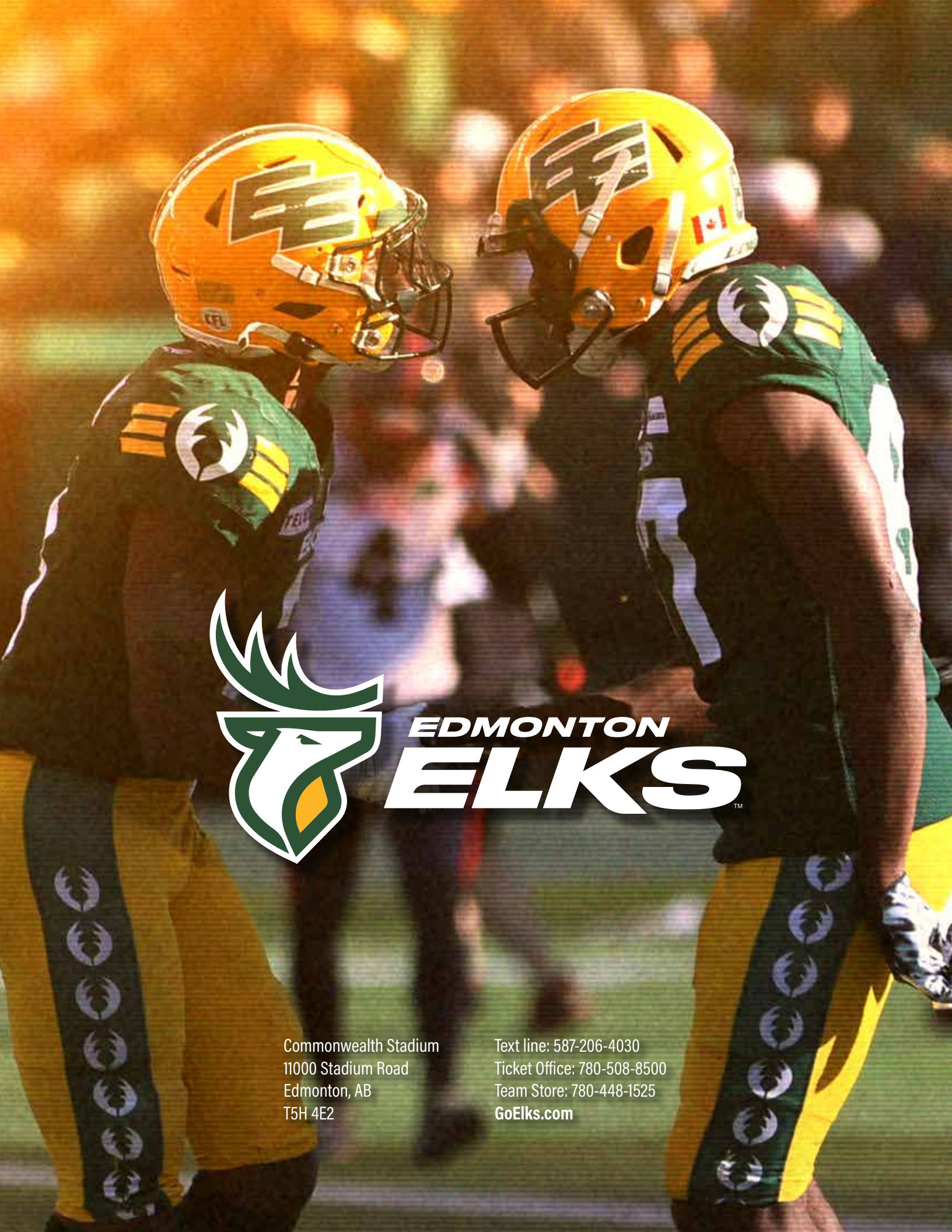
